

Work Incentives Benefits Counseling

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Many individuals with disabilities and their families fear they will lose Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Medicaid benefits if they obtain competitive integrated employment.

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During WIBC, youth with disabilities and their families learn about work incentives, such as the Student Earned Income Exclusion, that allow individuals to work while retaining their benefits.

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Work Incentives Benefits Counseling (WIBC) helps SSI and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) recipients understand how employment affects their benefits, empowering them to make informed career decisions.

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Participants in the WIBC program have higher employment rates (34%-58.9%) compared to non-participants (13%-43.9%) and tend to earn higher wages.

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WIBC is offered through the state-federal vocational rehabilitation (VR) program.

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Transition educators can help students and families by connecting them with VR benefits counselors and incorporating WIBC into transition planning.
